Our vision is still to create a local secondary school. We are committed and will continue to work towards this goal.



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NESE's Meeting with the Ministry of Education

In July committee members met with Coralanne Child, who is the Programme Manager for Christchurch Earthquake Recovery in the Ministry of Education. The purpose of the meeting was to share information between both parties; to advocate for our community and to continue our involvement in developing a strong positive education system for the future. During the three hour meeting we were brought up to date with the current education situation.

The land under four Christchurch secondary schools is significantly compromised namely Avonside Girls' High School, Shirley Boys' High School, Marian College and Unlimited. Geotechnical results for them have been prioritised and are due by November 2012. Then decisions will be made about whether the schools will stay or retreat from their land. There are suitable sites available if any school has to be moved to make the transition smooth.

We were shown many interesting maps. The Ministry has maps for every school showing where their students live. For some suburbs the coloured dots were all the same showing support of a local school. For Parklands and areas in the the 8083 postcode the dots were clustered around primary schools. However, for secondary schools the colours were like 100s and 1000s with students going in all directions for secondary schooling, as we all know.

Two maps are attached showing Christchurch schools with their post earthquake roll changes and estimated repair costs. The Shaping Education website http://shapingeducation.minedu.govt.nz/ has more maps including school geotechnical needs. Look under the Resources tab and then select Current Situation.



The Education Renewal Recovery Programme

NESE Committee members have had comprehensive input into this document. The final draft programme has been with the Government for Cabinet approval for some time now. It should be announced very soon.

Some of the ideas proposed submissions to the draft programme involved 1) secondary schools sharing Eq: a student attending their home school for four days a week then attending lessons at another school on the fifth day; 2) Extension of secondary school open hours allowing students to study at more than one education level at the same time Eg: NCEA levels 1 & 2; Eg: Year 13 subjects with tertiary subjects. It is likely these ideas went to Cabinet, but they would need to be approved by Cabinet and then enacted by the schools themselves to be realised.

From the final programme you can expect to see a plan for the future direction for education. It should reflect the extensive input from educators and the community. It will not state specifically what will happen to each school. School specific outcomes are likely to require more consultation with each school's community.

Charter Schools

Charter schools are a proposed new model for creating schools. There have been charter schools in New Zealand for many years under different names. There will be energetic debates about their suitability for the New Zealand environment.

There are plenty of examples of charter schools in many different countries overseas. Some of them have good features. Others have specific issues where strong lessons can be learned. It's important that a robust model be created if charter schools are to be more common in New Zealand. However, it is clear that a charter school will only be created when a community wants one. They will be a response to a community need and their accountability will be high.

Submissions

The NESE Committee has been working alongside agencies in charge rebuilding Christchurch, attending meetings and spending long hours making submissions to the Christchurch City Council, CERA and Ministry of Education. You can read our submissions at www.nese.org.nz under the proposal tab.

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Christchurch North East Secondary Education Committee Incorporated

Annual Report 2012.

The North East Secondary Education Committee (NESE) was formed in 2008 following growing concern in the community about local high schooling options in North East Christchurch. NESE's Management Committee members are all parents and grandparents from a wide cross section of the local community.

NESE's aims and objectives:-

- To promote and advocate to advance secondary education in the North East of Christchurch.
- To be an advocate for parents and children in the North East of Christchurch.
- To be impartial in its investigations and to address the majority of the community's needs in its recommendations.
- To promote and advocate for the development of a local high school in the North East of Christchurch.
- To raise funds for the development of a local high school.
- To support the development of a local high school through fundraising to provide extra resources, facilities and opportunities.

Achievements in 2011.

Our Committee constantly works hard to meet very tight time frames. We made excellent progress in our first two years by always preparing for the next phase ahead of time to maintain a constant momentum. We were making good, steady, progress. In 2011 we had hoped to make further significant progress towards our community's goal of a local high school. We expected an announcement from the Minister of Education early in term one of 2011. Unfortunately, February's earthquake significantly altered the domestic landscape, interrupting last year's schedule.

While there was a pause in our activities, we didn't give up or cease in our efforts. We stood back long enough to gain perspective and a clear vision. We then decided our extensive knowledge of this area's education requirements would be best used by becoming involved and participating in plans for the educational rebuild of North East Christchurch, as well as greater Christchurch.

Issues, trends, predictions and planning.

The earthquake on 22nd February 2011 caused significant disruption to high schooling across Christchurch with many high schools subsequently sharing campuses in split shifts. Avonside Girls' High School and Shirley Boys' High School were badly damaged. Both schools have now returned to their original sites and are using existing undamaged classrooms as well as relocatable classrooms. A decision on the future of these two schools will be made within the next two years.

Since February 2011, 4000 students have moved schools. There have been roll losses at some primary schools including Burwood Primary School in our catchment area, as well as Avondale, Aranui, and Banks Avenue schools. Fewer high school students changed schools, with approximately 1000 leaving Christchurch. Many teaching jobs have also been lost.

Student capacity at Avonside Girls' and Shirley Boys' is reduced and may remain so in the interim. Student numbers attending both Aranui and Linwood High Schools are also down. However, overall the remaining capacity citywide is still not enough to provide for the remaining students.

The Ministry of Education's priority at this time is to focus on house and land decisions to determine the long term education needs for this area. Innovative short term solutions may also include reassessing the restrictions on integrated schools, reviewing high school zones and making long term decisions on the future of Avonside Girls' and Shirley Boys' High Schools.

New land for housing is going through consent stages in many areas of Christchurch, particularly in the North East, North, and South West. These developments will initially cater for resettling Christchurch residents who will continue to use the existing school network.

In addition, a projected influx of 30,000 people is expected to come to Christchurch to assist with rebuilding the city. Some of these people will bring families with school aged children. It is likely that many will settle in Eastern Christchurch, as housing may be more readily available.

Schools in Christchurch did not have to submit their July 2011 student roll statistics. This has made it difficult to gather robust school data. Christchurch City's Census was cancelled after the earthquake. This has resulted in student number predictions and projections only. In the past Christchurch population predictions made using insufficient data have fallen well short of the actual population growth. Education decisions must be based on sound information. Getting accurate, current, student roll data and making robust, evidence based projections will be critical for education planning in 2012.

NESE considers the provision of a local high school in North East Christchurch is still a priority. This would provide an anchor for families and businesses to stay here. It would cater for the growth of local subdivision developments and service families commuting from North of the city.

Education models to research and consider.

In seeking to fill the secondary education needs in our local community, we must consider all options presented. It is important to acknowledge that school models in the future may not follow a familiar model in their governance, structure or building design. Our Committee's role is to investigate thoroughly, be impartial and address the majority of the community's needs.

In 2011 the Government made two significant policy announcements relating to schools:-

1) Public Private Partnerships (PPPs)

PPPs were announced by the Government in April 2011 and must now be considered for all large Government projects. PPPs enable the Government to form partnerships with private organisations to secure funding, enhancing the viability of large projects. The first PPP schools announced were a new primary and a new secondary school in Hobsonville, Auckland. They are scheduled to open at the start of 2013 and 2014 respectively. A PPP will now have to be investigated and considered when building any new school.

2) Charter Schools

Charter schools were announced under a Government coalition agreement in December 2011. Charter schools allow communities to run their own school funded by the state, similar to an integrated school but with more freedom. In the announcement Christchurch East was nominated as a suitable candidate for a charter school.

Lobbying and Advocacy.

NESE representatives met with the Ministry of Education in October to "shape the future of education", in a workshop as part of the social and future thinkers group.

NESE participated in Think Beyond's workshop run by Dr Cheryl Doig in November where the aim was to create high level guidelines for guiding education decisions.

Last year Committee members spent many hours researching and preparing documents to present to the Government and its agencies. These include submissions to:-

- Christchurch City Council Draft Central Plan
- Draft Recovery Strategy for Greater Christchurch
- Education Renewal Recovery Plan

Education Renewal Recovery Plan.

NESE has had strong input into the development of the draft plan through participation in a number of different workshops and by preparing a submission. A Ministry of Education source has indicated the Education Recovery Plan will be considered by Government in February and then put out for public consultation in April, with the final draft available in June 2012. NESE will continue to be involved in the development of education strategies for Christchurch City as a whole, with a special interest in the North East of the city.

Forming alliances

The NESE Committee consults widely to establish good working relationships with influential people and major organisations, while continuing to connect with families and the local community in conversation. In the last two years committee members met or attended meetings with Mayor Bob Parker, Christchurch City Councillors, Burwood Pegasus Community Board members, Ministry of Education Officials, representatives from Ngai Tahu, CORE Education Services, Think Beyond, the Police Youth Crime Division, local principals and other business and community leaders. We have benefited greatly from their advice and encouragement. Our community has a vision to rebuild and enhance the infrastructure here in North East Christchurch. A strong desire for a local high school is a focus of this vision.

Marketing and Publicity

NESE has engaged the local community on the issue of local education and a local high school. We want to hear people's ideas and we believe everyone should have an opportunity to have their say. NESE is supported by more than 1000 families and individuals subscribed to our email newsletter. In 2011 we sent two email newsletters. We had a few radio slots and made the newspapers a couple of times. The publicity campaign with NESE signs on local fences and large stickers on green wheelie bins has lessened as the signs experience wear and tear and graffiti. However, sign feedback and direction to our website is still proving effective. Our Website www.nese.org.nz had 1096 unique visitors in 2011. We also have a Facebook page.

Fundraising

NESE undertook no specific fundraising activities in 2011 and received no donations. Fortunately the year's expenses were less than anticipated so we were able to pay for our expenses with money raised in 2010. We would welcome donations to assist with NESE's 2012 expenses. NESE is a registered charity so donations of \$5.00 or more are tax deductible.

NESE's Key Messages are:-

- There is an ongoing problem with insufficient capacity in Christchurch high schools, particularly in North East Christchurch. Education planning must be based on robust, evidence based data.
- The community in North East Christchurch is certain a local high school forms part of the solution
- The Minister of Education has a review of the options in front of her.
- A local high school would increase business and residential confidence, rebuilding our community while stimulating the recovery in North East Christchurch.
